I vaguely remember seeing the Mert Williams Wagon race in Southern Minnesota back in the early 1980's on the rare family trip to Kasson. Bob was nice enough spend some time with me to go into the detail of the build of this car. Turns out it was one of Bob's old Super Stocks built up to look like Mert's Wagon. They did a great job.

The Charlie Swartz car is really something else to see in person. Bob's done a great job of restoring this original piece of dirt track racing history. The midengine wedge car had a fairly short life span. After

dominating the few races it was in, promoters quickly outlawed the midengine concept.

There's part of me that wonders what would have happened if the Swartz midengine car wouldn't have been banned so quickly. Would traditional front engine cars have gone by the wayside and all Dirt





Late Models be midengine beasts these days? The ingenuity of the car reminds me of another innovator that was ahead of his time; Jim Shampine. Jim built some of the most radical Super Modifieds on the East Coast. Shampine had one of the first successful rear-engine

Super Modifieds. The Shampine car was also quickly banned after dominating races.

In addition to the really cool cars on hand, several current and retired drivers were on hand to enjoy the festivities. On top of the past and current drivers on hand, there were representatives from area tracks, photographers and others in the industry.

As we approach the 2022 racing season on the local level, there are many people moving to different divisions, or maybe just working hard to chase perfection in the same division.

One driver making a big step is 16-year-old Charles Rufi. He is moving up from a four cylinder stock car to a midget. Charles told a bit about how everything came about, saying, "My name is Charles William Miguel Rufi. I was born in Guatemala City, Guatemala, where at five months of age I was adopted by my loving parents, Bill and Connie."

Charles then grew up around racing, saying, "At the age of two, I started driving a go-kart around the yard. Ever since that time, I have had a need for speed." At a young age, his parents started taking him to the races, including World Of Outlaws events at Beaver Dam, as well as weekly races at tracks such as Lafayette County Speedway and Madison International Speedway.

As he grew, it was practically a given that he would want to try his hand at the driving part of racing. "I bought a four cylinder and raced at Darlington (LCS) and Wilmot on the dirt. Then, I decided that I wanted something faster," said Charles. "At first I wanted to get a 604 wingless sprint car to race in the series in Wisconsin. Then, I thought about getting a 360. Then, I came across a midget being sold in Vermont. I looked it over on Facebook and talked to the fellow who was selling it. I read up on midgets and the history of the USAC and the legendary Badger Midgets and

thought this would be the way to go."

During Thanksgiving break of 2021, they took the trip out to Vermont to bring the car back. "Wayne Stearns was the guy selling the car, and he was a successful big block Chevy modified race car driver, and he was happy to see that youth were still interested in racing," said Charles.

So, in 2022, Charles will be doing some open

wheel racing. He intends to race the Badger Midget series, as well as some IMRA and USAC races. You may be thinking to yourself that this is another instance where a young guy is given a car with parental backing only, but that is not the case, as Charles stated, saying, "This is supported by Me. I work every day that I can at Truttmann dairy farms, LLC, as well as at Devoe family farms." So, he works for his racing desires, as well as attending classes at New Glarus high school.

With that being said, Charles and team have also found many sponsors which

help a great deal, including Judd's auto body, Marv's farm toys and antiques, Luna Maya authentic Mexican food, Monroe Powersports, Cork down Saloon, Andy Templeton trucking LLC, Super Shox, RPM Motors, and Disch trucking LLC.

Should be fun watching Charles gain a foothold to his dream in 2022!

Another driver making a step up in 2022 will be

Ronnie Osborne. Ronnie started racing a few years ago in the Sixer division at Madison International Speedway, but quickly moved up to four-cylinder Bandits, where he was quite successful, racing at any track he could find that was racing, gaining a ton of experience and quickly winning.

This year Ronnie is making a big step up to a UMA Pro Late Model, which was formerly known as



a late model or limited late model. Ronnie told of how this came to be, saying, "I talked with Frank Kreyer at the Dells banquet last Fall, and he told me about the car." The car had been raced a limited amount of time by Chad Miller in 2021.

After pondering things over a bit, Ronnie decided to get the car and make the move up. "Frank is building the car, and we will race with the help of his team, SuperStar Motorsports, mostly at the Dells, but

some other shows as well if all goes well."

Kyle Hoffmann is the defending champion in the sportmod division at the Lafayette County Speedway, and plans to stick with his same car, albeit with a little fine tuning, saying, "We plan to defend our 2021 IMCA sportmod championship at LCS, and maybe hit up a couple of other tracks during the season as well."

It looks like the very first big super late model special will take place at the Dells Raceway Park on Sunday, April 10th, with the Icebreaker 100. The pre-entry list of expected drivers looks simply amazing for this race. Also on hand will be the Midwest Trucks and 602 outlaw late models.

The Big 8 late models will open at the 45th annual spring classic at the Rockford Speedway on Saturday night, April 23rd. This will be the first time this event will take place in the evening, with start time being at 5:00 P.M. Mid-Am cars and the Bandit division will also compete during this show. Speaking of Rockford, the track will be kicking off its 75th season of operation, which is simply amazing!

Madison International Speedway will open up its oval track schedule with the annual Joe Shear Classic 200 for the ARCA Midwest Tour, on May 1st, with the event paying \$15,000 dollars to win. 602 Late Models will also be on the card.

Tom raced in the "old" sportsman division at Columbus and Jefferson back in the late 1970's, then raced a late model for a time at Rockford in the early 1980's. It is finally Spring so the annual preseason Race Team Fundraisers are in full swing, whether they are called a Beer Bust, a Beer Bash, or a Smoker they all serve the same purpose, as a fundraiser to help support a race team financially and it also serves as a motivational tool both for you and the race team. The annual Wolff Motorsports event was recently held at Turtles Bar in Shakopee (MN).

"This is our 9th or 10th event like this, we had one at Fireside one time, other than that it's always been at Turtles (owned by former racer Bryan Turtle), everyone loves this place, it's not hard to get people to come here. You get to see all the faces you haven't seen in a while and it kind of triggers everybody to get excited for what is to come soon."

Wolff Motorsports charged a \$10 entry fee that provided free tap beer and ½ price drinks. The place was

packed with hundreds of family, friends, sponsors and fans who also participated in a 50/50 raffle where the winner cashed in about \$1,000. Numerous businesses and individuals donated prizes that were given away by picking a random ticket out of the drawing bucket also raising funds.

"All of a sudden we got all this stuff donated, people are great out there, it was a great event." said Wolff.

Andover (MN) resident Jamie Hurd owner of J&L Collectables donates over a hundred die-cast cars to drivers in exchange for putting a sticker on their car, he attends a race fundraiser nearly every weekend of the Spring attending about 7 of them every year in MN and WI.

Dan Diecher is the announcer at LaCrosse (WI) Fairgrounds Speedway and Tomah-Sparta (WI) Speedway. For about 16 years Diecher has donated his time to race team "Smokers" in Wisconsin, where he sets up DJ equipment and is the event MC, he usually will do somewhere between a handful to a dozen of these events every Spring. "I see between 10-20 different drivers, from different divisions and different tracks at everyone else's smokers. I think family, friendship and the unity keeps local racing strong."

Wolff said he is going to race the #32 Late Model at Elko (MN) Speedway full-time in 2022 and race the Thunder Car mainly at special events away from home. Last year they found out that racing all three cars (including bando #32 driven by Jake Lipinksi) was a difficult task to do well and the 2022 ELKO schedule has Bandoleros on the schedule every race night. The Late Model will be the primary focus this year, "We've been working on the car but not 'hard core,' so this is kind of our sign to get our butts in gear and get it done," said Wolff.

These preseason race team fundraisers can be a very important part of a successful race team. There are a bunch of these events coming up in April and early May so I encourage race fans to follow your favorite team on social media, attend their local event and contribute. You most likely will have a great time and it is sure to get both you and the race team motivated for the upcoming 2022 race season. I can't wait to open the microphone and say "the Green is out and Here we Go!"

This off-season in specific was more special because I got to participate in not one but two Flat Out Fridays at Fiserv Forum in Milwaukee, WI. A lot of my off season was devoted to studying the new world of racing I was submerged in.

I wasn't the only one with a busy off season. In preparation for this article, I reached out to some of my friends at the track to get many perspectives on the off season. I first got to talking with Loren Kelly, the Managing Director at BOX3 Media.

"It's kind of funny how everyone calls the 'off season' a break or rest. It's still full steam ahead for everyone. The trip we put together to PRI in Indianapolis was huge for a lot of our guys in terms of forming partnerships with different companies and getting outfitted for 2022. On the PR side, we've overhauled everything at Box3. Better graphics, streamlined press releases

and bringing on more great teams is just the top of the iceberg. All that takes an insane amount of hours on the phone and in front of a computer screen. All those things and more set up our teams for success by representing them all the more professionally and giving their sponsors and partners the exposure they deserve

Someone in particular I wanted to discuss with about the preparation throughout the off season is one of Kelly's drivers, Tyler Tischendorf, who is running for the Bumper

to Bumper IRA Sprint Car Rookie of the Year title in 2022. "We've spent hours and hours discussing the different possible schedules he could run based on the



equipment he has and time available." Tischendorf himself even noted that, "We've had a very hectic off season making the decision in December to race with

the IRA. After reviewing our program from a financial standpoint, it made sense to make the jump." After long hours in the shop we have gotten everything ready for our first season in a 410." He is looking forward to traveling to new tracks in the area that he didn't previously visit in his 360 career.

Every team's mindset has to be different since they all have very unique situations and schedules, but in talking with Joe B Miller and his father, Rick, they put it best I think. If you plan to race a lot, you have to treat every night as another opportunity to win or do well. You can't let past night's linger in your mind or weigh on you, as they'll only drag you down. You can learn from them for sure, but you have to move on to the next opportunity."

Other teams are preparing for a new beast to control. Preston Ruh out of Elkhart Lake is also planning on running his new 410 for the second half of the season. I got the chance to talk to Chris Clark who works on set ups for Ruh's car and is helping him transition to his new horsepower, he said, "I love working with young drivers that strive to make themselves better week in and week out, I am extremely excited to get the season started. We have put together a

package that I feel can be very potent and we showed lots of strength and chemistry at the end of the season last year. I felt like everybody was pleased and everybody was on the same page." He is looking forward to seeing Ruh on the track in 2022.

With driver's preparing to hit the track, Nathan "The Shirtless Wonder" Crane is gearing up for what seems to be a true outlaw year. He will be piloting the #89 car (Wingless) for Gaertner motorsports, the #1 car in the wingless division and the other #1 car with the winged 360 division all for Colburn Motorsports. And if you didn't think that was crazy cool enough for the Shirtless Wonder, he will be making his USAC debut in 2022.

Crane talked about his emotions going into the 2022 "true outlaw" season commenting, "I have about 13 different emotions trying to fly out a little door all at once haha, Happy, scared, Anxious, fear, sad, nervous, adrenaline, gratitude, grateful, excited, Fun, enjoyment, and thrill."

His goals for the 2022 season consist of making the A-Main with the wingless every night whether that's through the B-Main, get at least 1 Win, and try to get a Top 5. With the winged 360, he plans on having fun in a wing car for the first time. With his debut with USAC wingless, Crane has the goal to make the feature.

Coming off of a double championship year, Travis Arenz is ready to pick up where he left off in

2022. In 2021, Arenz clinched both the Plymouth 360 Sprint Car track championship and was crowned the MSA champion as well. His plans for the 2022 season are to race in both the 360 and 410 ranks. He said that the best part of returning to the track after a long season is being able to compete again and do the one thing he loves in life and that's racing. As for his goals in the 2022 season, "with the 410 car I'm hoping for top 5 finishes and to learn and get faster each time we get on the track. With the 360 I'm hoping to finish top 3 every race that we compete in and to just get out and have fun this season." He's ready for the warm weather and the smell of methanol. I cannot thank him enough for taking the time to talk with me about 2022.

One of the final drivers of this article is Chris Vogel from Cottage Grove, MN. Just like Crane, he has excitement and "a



New Dirt

Before we ever moved to North Carolina, I made a spreadsheet of all the racetracks in the state. I paid particularly close attention to the asphalt tracks. I wanted to have the opportunity to experience local asphalt racing in the motorsport's capital of the world. A string of rain outs and other issues opened my schedule to allow for some exploration in March.

I had the opportunity to photograph races at two asphalt tracks in North Carolina. The first was Caraway Speedway in Sophia, NC. The track was just over an hour from my Kannapolis home and off the beaten path. The track was built in 1966 as a dirt track and paved 6 years later. A little less than half a mile in length, the track has all the charm of a local short track. I got Raceway Park vibes just being there. My fellow photography friend, Blake and I journeyed to



Caraway on a bitterly cold Saturday for the CARS Tour opener. The Championship Auto Racing Series (CARS) is an asphalt late model series forged out of the remains of the old Hooters Pro Cup Series. Many of today's NASCAR stars raced in the series on their way up the ladder. The track had breakfast sandwiches and coffee for sale which made dealing with the weather tolerable. We took some photographs of the facility and of the pits, but the cold weather and a wet racing surfaced pushed all on track activity to Sunday, and we were forced to go home having not

experience any racing. We returned Sunday for the two-division headliner of Late Model Stock and Pro Late Model.

Car types and surfaces aside, asphalt racing has a distinctive difference when it comes to photography that dirt racing does not have. The presence of time. When you photograph dirt races there are very few on track laps before heat racing begins. With asphalt you have practice sessions that allow you time to experiment around with your work. I was happy to have this extra time and used it to try some new techniques I had been researching. I walked all around Caraway Speedway that day making a mental note of places to shoot from and building out my journal for the track. The day ended with a double dose of Kvapil. Caden Kvapil picked up the Pro Late Model win and his brother Carson made a late gamble to stay out and win the Late Model Stock feature.

It was really rewarding to see this event and photograph a lot of these drivers. A few years from now, I have no doubt that they will be lighting up the Cup Series. I made the decision early the next week to check another track off my spreadsheet the following weekend. I journeyed to Hickory, North Carolina and the Hickory Motor Speedway. Dubbed both the, "Birthplace of the NASCAR stars" and "The World's Most Famous Short Track", I was ecstatic to witness everything the track had to offer. Like Caraway, Hickory's story began on dirt and was later paved and reconfigured several times. The track now sits at just under 3/8 a mile. Many of my photography friends in the industry have boasted about the unlimited potential for photographs at this track. Numerous angles and interesting spots exist, you just must figure out how to

use them. The Easter Bunny 150 was on the schedule for the Pro All Star Series Late Models. A few of the drivers from the CARS event at Caraway were in attendance, as was NASCAR Cup Series driver William Byron. Seeing Byron back at a track where he cut his teeth early in his career for JR Motorsports only made the track slogan ring true. True to form, Byron would end up in victory lane that day, and in NASCAR victory lane at Atlanta Motor Speedway the next. I've only ever really watched Kyle Larson compete in another racing series and win; it was nice to know others have the same ability. Some would call it Cherry Picking; I call it racing. I've seen countless drivers from "higher levels" of racing compete and lose in the process. Byron's victory was no cake walk.

Hickory Speedway lived up to every ounce of hype that friends threw at me. In one appearance the track has already made its way to my list of favorite tracks to shoot at. Hickory was just under 45 miles from my front door and will become a go to place when time allows.

Taking in races at these two asphalt tracks allowed me to rediscover who I am. I grew up on asphalt tracks and spent countless summer nights under the lights at Raceway Park and occasionally Elko Speedway just being a race fan. Soaking it all in and falling in love with the sport. I chatted with several people at Caraway and Hickory while there. They told me stories and showed me photos from days that have long since passed. Memories of their childhood spent at these exact tracks. One guy recalled standing by the flag stand after every feature at Caraway, cheering on the drivers. He later raced in a division at the track and won a championship. Two decades later he was still there enjoying every minute of the place that grew him.

My career has been spent and made on dirt tracks. It has gotten me to the national stage and weekends are now spent going from town to town. Another new track almost every weekend. Places that are sometimes a thousand miles from where it all began. From time to time I will look back at my life in racing and smile at how far I've come. Two racetracks in the Carolinas have now taught me to appreciate these moments even more. Because even if my time at these places is for just one night, these tracks mean so much to others. To borrow and turn phrase on Hickory, these places are the birthplace of the racing fans.

I may spend one night at a bull ring in Tennessee this year and never return there. But while I'm there, I am experiencing the place that gave way to someone else's best moments and most cherished memories. If even for a moment in time, I am living inside someone else's Raceway Park.

The turning of the calendar towards Spring brings optimism as the short track racing season is on the horizon here in the upper Midwest. After a couple of quick winter trips to Daytona and Las Vegas for Speed Weeks and NASCAR races, my "local" season is set to begin, weather-permitting, with the World of Outlaws Late Model Series Illini 100 at Farmer City Raceway the first weekend of April followed by the IceBreaker 100 at Dells Raceway Park on April 10th. From there, the main focus will turn to my "home" track, the Slinger Speedway for what is shaping up to be a special 2022 season. Only three years ago, it seemed it would take nothing short of a miracle to bring the ARCA Midwest Tour to the World's Fastest Quarter-Mile Oval but that's what will greet fans at the season opener as the popular touring super late model series comes to Slinger April 24th, for the Miracle on the High Banks which will also serves as the opening round for Slinger's Elite 8 Super Late Model Series. Having been privy to some of the behind the scenes situations over the past several

years, I can't tell you how special this event is and how much work went into putting it together. It's a grand way to kick off an incredible 2022 season featuring many highlights including the return of Matt Kenseth for the now \$20,000 to win Slinger Nationals in July (Kenseth also returns to the Madison International Speedway in May for the Joe Shear Classic). In addition to the super late models, the Wisconsin pro late models (last year's late models), Midwest sportsman, modifieds, 602 outlaw late models, Midwest trucks, super beez, Slinger bees, Slinger sixers, figure 8's, legends, bandoleros, super cups, and sport trucks will all make 2022 stops at Slinger. I'll be there for all of it atop my familiar perch on the roof operating the camera for the live internet streaming of the races which this year will be available on the Racing America platform.

I've been standing on that roof above Slinger for better than 30 years now, having first been introduced to the view by then PR Director Mark Gundrum back around 1991. Over the years, I have stood next to and watched amazing racing action with NASCAR Hall of Famers Buddy Baker, Dale Jarrett, Bill Elliott, Alan Kulwicki and Rusty Wallace (who told me I like racing way too much). Dick Trickle, Butch Miller, Ted Musgrave, and even Tom Bigelow stood up there with me at one time. I've watched Matt Kenseth go from late model rookie of the year to Alan Kulwicki Memorial and Slinger Nationals winner to NASCAR Cup champion. I've had the pleasure of watching Joe Shear, Kyle Busch, Ken Schrader, Jim Sauter, Dennis Lampman, and Scott Hansen win Slinger races and saw Michael Waltrip, Ernie Irvan, Sterling Marlin, Kenny Wallace, Jimmy Spencer, and Kerry Earnhardt take on the high banks(I even had to keep an eye on a 15-year-old Jeffrey Earnhardt while Kerry raced). I have felt the intensity as John Close spotted for Rich Bickle and experienced the thrills of victories with his Nationals wins and even seen a few "agonies of

defeat" as well. I've seen Wisconsin Hall of Famers Al Schill Sr., Al Schill Jr., Conrad Morgan, Lowell Bennett, Jerry Eckhardt, and Bill Prietzel win countless races and watched Wisconsin racers Ty Majeski and Luke Fenhaus win and launch their national careers. I've watched national super star Bubba Pollard conquer the high banks and have seen barnstormers Steven Nasse and Erik Jones compete as well as Wisconsin racers Johnny Sauter and Derek Kraus whose path to NASCAR wound through Slinger. Last year I had a front row seat as Tony Stewart, Marco Andretti, Helio Castroneves, Paul Tracy, Hailie Deegan, Willy T Ribbs and Greg Biffle all learned quickly how to get around Slinger.

I've witnessed some of the greatest short track rivalries around from Robbie Reiser and Joel Laufer to Brad Mueller and Dave Feiler to Alex Prunty and Gary LaMonte to Dennis Prunty and Steve Apel. I have also had an up-close view of the unbridled passion of the fans, friends, and families of the drivers and can hear the thunderous sounds of joy that resonate above the cars when their driver finally scores his or her first victory. Other times you can hear the kids screaming the name of the drivers they are rooting for in unison and the roof is a pretty kick-ass seat for the fireworks shows too. But most importantly of all, I have gotten to know hundreds of true friends that most likely I would have never met or even talked to if not for all that time spend standing on the roof above Slinger Speedway.

The memories continue this month as the new short track season gets underway and I hope if you can't be there in person, you follow along with the live internet streaming coverage on Racing America. I'm sure all of you have similar stories that have played out at the many short tracks throughout the area and could write your own columns with the many races and drivers you have seen. Let's meet up this season and compare notes while we have a few.


